# Whose parish . . .? Some thoughts from the Vestry

One of the recurrent enquiries received in parish offices up and down the land is from couples wishing to get married. We at St George's and the Grosvenor Chapel are no exception. Those not resident within the parish boundaries, who have no family connection with the parish or who are not regular worshippers at either of its churches are told they must establish a 'qualifying connection' by becoming part of our worshipping community for not less than six months. Indeed, such is the same 'qualifying connection' fulfilled by the great majority of those on the electoral rolls of most inner city parishes because few qualify residentially. Gone are the days when successive generations of a family, lived, worked and worshipped in the same geographical area. That said, it is with a wry smile that one

tells a newly-engaged couple who may have worked in the parish for ten or twelve years but who live in more distant suburbs that, if they are to be married in the church they walk past daily, they must join an electoral roll few of whose existing members either live or work locally.

And yet a significant number of those who get married in our churches continue not only to worship with us after their nuptials but also to play a leading role in parish life. Look no further than pages six and seven of this Newsletter and details of the team spear heading the current fundraising campaign at St George's. Most of them first came to us to get married.

But that is only part of the picture. We should not underestimate the numbers of people who drop by our churches during the week in search of solace, silence or an ancestral

connection nor the numbers who attend concerts in the two buildings. Sunday by Sunday 70 or 80 people worship at St George's and a similar number do so at the Grosvenor Chapel. Numbers are somewhat higher at the major feasts. However since October 2012 we have, week in week out, also given out 80 or 90 food vouchers to the homeless who come to our doors. Twenty or thirty of these people are regulars and some, in spite of the best efforts of St Mungo's and the Westminster Roughsleepers' Unit, sleep under the portico at St George's and do so for extended periods. Thus far at least, none of them have claimed a residential entitlement to a church wedding.

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# The Rector, The Revd Roderick Leece, writes:

Malcolm Lothian who has been the Headmaster of St George's Hanover Square School for nearly forty years, will retire at the end of the academic year. As a long-serving former Churchwarden, Server, Parish Clerk and former Chairman of the Trustees of the Hyde Park Place Estate Charity he has been one of the corner stones of our Parish life, and we both congratulate him for the legacy he leaves of a good school, and wish him well as he looks towards the future, not least the continuing involvement and support he will offer the Church. The Bishop of London will preside at a farewell celebration at the Grosvenor Chapel on 21st July, and I'm sure there will be literally thousands of people who, like me, will miss him and be grateful for all he has done for them and for the Kingdom in this area.

# Community Partnership with Christian Aid

I promised in the last issue to say more about our commitment to raise £5000 which will be tripled match funded by the European Union. We made a start with a wonderful informal Community Concert on St George's Day, which raised over £1000, and have since added over £500 more from sponsorship for the Rogation Sunday Beating the Bounds. Thank you to all who have given their time and support to both events. We have the inside of 2 years to raise the remaining funds that have been pledged.

The project we are supporting is NURTURING CHANGE - Maternal and Child Healthcare in Kenya. Please email Stephen Wikner (contact details on page 16) if you would like an e copy of the Fact Sheet about Kenya, or the Project.

In Narok County, where this project is based, only 30% of the population have access to maternal and child healthcare services and only 17.6% actually use them. As well as extremely high maternal mortality rates there are also high rates of stunting in children under five. Cultural beliefs and traditions have proved a barrier to better healthcare, and many women choose to give birth in their village with only the help of traditional birth attendants - local, often elderly women, with no formal medical training. Men often dominate decisions around healthcare, and women have to seek permission from men to go to hospital or use family planning methods.

Over four years, more than 350,000 women, men, children, and young people will benefit from a huge range of activities, as three Christian Aid partners work in collaboration with national and local governments to deliver the project. The Anglican Church of Kenya Narok Integrated De-

velopment Programme will be joined by the Christian Missionary Fellowship, and the Anglican Church of Kenya Transmara Rural Development Programme.

As in too many other parts of the world, women die in childbirth every day in this part of Kenya, and the project is providing immediate help in the form of medicines, basic medical equipment, and ambulances that can reach the isolated rural communites.

I have already referred to problems associated with cultural practices in this area. Rather than try to destroy or undermine these traditions, the plan is to work with traditional leaders to improve how things are done. So that traditional birth attendants will be employed to bring women into medical centres for antenatal appointments or births, and will be trained in basic medical care so that they can provide assistance locally. There is also an education programme in reproductive health and family planning aimed at involving men so that they engage with these issues. The objective is to recruit and train more than 1000 community health workers.

I have recently received the first update about progress. Although the elections of March last year delayed the start of some aspects of the project, the teams have already seen some impressive and exciting changes:

- Significantly higher attendance at antenatal clinics
- Family planning services better used where motherto mother support groups have been established
- More children referred for immunisation
- More 'skilled deliveries' at childbirth

 Good relationships with the Ministry of Health leading to direct government intervention and assistance

Finally our prayers have been asked for the mothers and children who will benefit from improved health service; for healthcare workers and volunteers being trained; for our partners carrying out this large and complex project; and for fathers, siblings and young people receiving education and hearing messages that will change the way they live.

The Marriage Preparation Day for Engaged Couples held jointly with the Grosvenor Chapel in May was well received, and the feedback has encouraged Fr. Richard and me to arrange future courses.

There are daily prayers in church, Monday - Friday at 12.10pm The Midday Office is said on most days, but with the Eucharist on Fridays and Saints Days. Please join us if you are in the area.

A Requiem for departed loved ones will be celebrated on Friday 5<sup>th</sup> September at 12.10pm. Please inform the Verger if you wish to include the names of

loved ones. His contact details are on page 16.

### **AFTER TRINITY.....**

I am writing this after having celebrated the Feast of the Undivided and Holy Trinity, as the Church enters a very long stretch of "Ordinary Time", all those "Sundays after Trinity." It is wonderful to celebrate the Mystery of the Christian God, after having passed through the liturgical high points of the year - Holy Week, Easter, Ascension and Pentecost - that tell us so much about the dynamic nature of God.

It is easy to dismiss the doctrine of the Trinity as a mere Christian abstraction. Yet, it emerges from what and how God reveals Himself in time, in a person, Jesus of Nazareth, and also in the indwelling presence and energy of the Spirit, both sent by the Transcendent One, with whom Jesus is sufficiently intimate to call Father. In the words of Eberhard Jüngel, "God is subject, predicate, and object of the revelation-event." God is the

revealer, the act of revelation and the revealed in this act of self-revelation.

So you have with the Trinity that reconciliation of opposites: unity and diversity; one yet three, in total exchange and interpenetration; all held together in a communion of love, because God *is* Love.

The Church Fathers saw that it was possible to reconcile a certain asymmetry of roles within the Godhead, with the essential of the equality "persons" (hypostaseis) of the Trinity. In other words, the Transcendent One, the Almighty Creator, the Father occupies the role in the Trinity of being the locus, the font or source (arche), that sends the Son and the Spirit into the world, as His "two hands." That the Father sends and is the locus and source of the Godhead, does not mean that the Son or the Spirit are inferior in anyway, because both are equally God, although their roles within the Godhead are different. For it is never possible to divide up the Trinity: the Father participates fully in the work of the Son and Spirit and vice versa.

We at the Chapel exist with St George's Hanover Square in a certain historic asymmetry of having been sent. The Chapel is the result of Georgian church planting. St George's is the "mother" church. For two hundred and eighty-four years, we have existed together in the unity of the parish, with varying

degrees of interaction and with distinct ecclesial cultures and identities. Now we are both to the secular world, two rather small, easily ignored organisations that struggle to leave any substantial mark on the Mayfair that surrounds us.

If we are called, as it seems we may be, to a closer degree of co-operation and sharing than in the past, then it seems that we have much to learn from that Trinitarian reconciliation of opposites. The Son and Spirit may have distinct roles from the Father, yet are never divided from Him, but interdependent. The Gospels say that the Son is obedient to the Father, but when does the Father impose or brandish His will? The Son and Spirit are sent by the Father, but when are they ever less than "very God of very God"? The Son, who in order to become human, empties himself, takes on the form of the servant, within in a Trinitarian unity, whose very being is constituted by self-giving love. Mysteries to ponder, indeed!



With a background in theatre and cultural events, I hope that my experience and enthusiasm will be of value to the fundraising team.


### Stephanie Hewitt


# FINDING SILENCE AND STILLNESS some thoughts by the Rector

Modern living can make us very unaccustomed to silence and stillness. Often people feel threatened by the thought of silence even for a short time. Sometimes I am amazed by the noise issuing from a neighbouring car as I cross the street here in London and I wonder why people are so unaware of the value of silence.


When I am fortunate enough to visit the country, I often notice the soothing effect that the silence has on me. When I take the trouble to slow down, I become more conscious of the presence of God in my life. It is not even necessary to spend a lot of time in this form of spiritual exercise. It can be done in a minute. A train journey may give you time to think and be silent. A visit to the park may dispose you to greater awareness of the presence of God. Turning off the radio or TV may give you an inkling of the possibilities that silence has to offer. Whatever happens, don't be afraid of the silence within and without. The real purpose of silence is to be able to 'hear' God with inner ears. This story from the Old Testament about the Prophet Elijah may help you understand how God seems to have a preference for stillness and silence as a way to communicate with us.

Then Elijah went into a cave and spent the night in it. Then the word of the Lord came to him, saying 'What are you doing here Elijah?' Then he was told 'Go out and stand on the mountain before God'. Then God passed by. There came a mighty wind, so strong it tore the mountains and shattered the rocks before God. But God was not in the wind. After the wind came an earthquake. But God was not in the earthquake. After the earthquake came a fire. But God was not in the fire. And after the fire there came the sound of a still, small voice, or gentle breeze. When Elijah heard this, he covered his face with his cloak and went and stood at the entrance of the cave. Then a voice came to him which said, 'What are you doing here Elijah?'

# The Phantom of the Opera comes to St George's

Saturday 1 November 2014, 7.00pm

Celebrating the second anniversary our new organ with a silent film showing with live, improvised organ music

Come to St George's on Saturday 1st November, the night after Halloween, for a spine-tingling night at the movies in which international organist David Briggs will improvise music to the classic film of 1925 'The Phantom of the Opera' starring Lon Chaney, who famously devised his own grotesque make-up. A bar will be available before and after the showing which begins at 7pm and will end at approximately 8.45pm.

100 years ago it was not unusual for cinemas to have an organ or a piano and for live music to be improvised during screenings. Keyboard players became adept at following every nuance of a film, creating an instant soundtrack. As

was poignantly portrayed in the recent silent film 'The Artist', the advent of the 'talkies' brought a swift end to the silent film era and to the livelihood of many of those associated with them, including the musicians. The art of improvising to a visual stimulus was lost until recently, when a few gifted players have revived. It. We are fortunate in David Briggs to have one of most celebrated perform for us.

David was organ scholar at King's College, Cambridge and held posts successively as Organist and Master of the Choristers at Truro and Gloucester Cathedrals. He is currently Artist in Residence at St James' Cathedral, Toronto. As well as his skills as a virtuoso improviser he is also known for his arrangements for organ of colossal orchestral scores including several of Mahler's symphonies.

Also on 1 November at St George's is the RCO London Organ Forum (10am-5pm), promoted, as is the film showing, in partnership with the London Bach Fest. Entitled 'Organ Music in Time of War', the Forum looks in particular at the music of three composers, Karg-Elert, Reger and Widor, all influenced by Bach and who, in 1914, just before the outbreak of World War 1, were created honorary members of the Royal College of Organists.
