

ew of us enjoy filling in forms; church administrators are no exception. Even before the year's end we are being chivvied by the diocesan powers that be to complete elements of the dreaded online Annual Return. I say dreaded because it is chock full of unanswerable questions which, to judge from their capacity to survive repeated challenges, clearly enjoy the status of the law of the Medes and Persians. However among questions that can be answered are ones that relate to so-called Fresh Expressions of Church. Those in the know will recognise this as the no longer particularly fresh expression of Our Lord's injunction to 'go out and make disciples of all nations'. But over time the Fresh Expressions label has been taken over and its meaning 'refined' to describe certain types of Christian activity and not others. While this year we have looked at whether Morning Calm\* could be described as a 'Fresh Expression', the fact that, in the

end, we decided it cannot only serves to confirm that St George's remains a square peg in this particular round hole.

And yet . . . a church that daily feeds the hungry and therefore welcomes into its hallowed warmth those who under other circumstances would never darken a church's doors\*\*; that addresses the focussed needs of young people in Zimbabwe (see page 2); that reaches out pastorally to those in prison well beyond the parish boundaries (see page 8); and that now vicariously through the global engagement of its new Assistant Priest turns its attention to the uncomfortable reality of modern slavery (see page 10) can surely be forgiven for adapting with some confidence the celebrated words of Wren's memorial to read Lector si testimonium requiris lege. 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t George's is delighted to welcome The Revd Dr Alan McCormack who was Licensed as an Assistant Priest by the Archdeacon of London on a festive Sunday at the end of January. Fr Alan invited friends from across the world: from his old school in Ireland; from his days as Dean and Chaplain of Trinity College Dublin when he was also Domestic Chaplain to the Archbishop; from the City of London where he served for almost a decade as Parish Priest of St Vedast's, Foster Lane, and more recently as Chaplain to the previous Lord Mayor. He is currently the Dean of Goodenough College and it was a joy to welcome many of his students to the celebration. Some of them I have met on their home territory and others at Holy Cocktails Open House at the Rectory. Please remember that Holy Cocktails are open to all. Do come along. Dates are given below.

Fr Alan is joining a team of gifted assistant clergy in the parish here at St George's and at the Grosvenor Chapel to whom we are most grateful. We now have an incumbent Rector who is just a plain Reverend, with three priests who although they are legally Curates are in fact Doctors (Dr Fermer PhD London, Dr Piggott DPhil Oxon, and Dr McCormack DPhil Oxon) as well as a fourth who is a Canon (Fr Alistair Macdonald-Radcliff) who helps us in an honorary capacity. And to cap it all, two of this distinguished quartet have been or are currently Deans! Fr Alan is aiming to be with us every fortnight and preach once a month, and I know that many of the congregation have enjoyed getting to know him immensely. We look forward to forging links of

LENT CHARITY

Our Lent charity is *Tariro* - Hope for Youth in Zimbabwe. The founder of *Tariro*, Fr Nicolas Stebbing who is himself from Zimbabwe and a member of the Community of the Resurrection in Mirfield came to preach Holy Week and Easter in the parish two years ago. And in November we welcomed him back to St George's to speak about the charity and answer questions. Since then we have agreed to support *Tariro* in partnership with our school and with the Grosvenor Chapel who have already been giving support. 'Tariro' means 'hope' in Shona which is one of the two main languages in Zimbabwe. Tariro UK is a small grant making body raising money to support orphans or young people in Zimbabwe whose one parent can no longer look after them. It funds between 45 and 50 young people who need help and support in four centres across the country, supporting them through school and then in further education or practical projects until they are able to stand on their own feet. *Tariro* gives these children and young people hope when they have had little, it gives them a reason to live and helps them thrive. #### PRAYER SPACES IN SCHOOLS

The Diocese of London is working in partnership with an organisation dedicated to introducing special areas set aside in schools for prayer and meditation/reflection. In the case of our own school, which received a silver star Religious Quality Mark before Christmas, we are already rather ahead in that there are prayer corners in every classroom and in three corridors. However we would like to do even more work on this and choose a week in the year to focus on setting up a bigger Prayer Space in the school and working out ways of linking it to what is already going on in classrooms. The idea is that the main input and preparation for this should come from Christians in local churches. I am therefore appealing for help from anybody at St George's or the Grosvenor Chapel who might be interested in receiving modest training and support as we work to agree and set up a Prayer Space. The commit-

ment would be specifically for a special week rather than carrying on into infinity!

Mothering Sunday is on Sunday 26<sup>th</sup> March and all children and families as well as children from our St George's Hanover Square School are warmly invited to join us for what are thrice yearly services where children are involved in leading worship/reading, and the sermon geared to families with children at the Sung Eucharist at 11am. The service is followed by customary refreshments. We extend a similar invitation to families with children to celebrate Pentecost on Whitsunday (4<sup>th</sup> June).

St George's Patronal Festival will be kept this year on Sunday 23<sup>rd</sup> April and the Sung Eucharist will be followed by a festive reception. Three days later on Wednesday 26th April the Royal British Legion will be presenting a special St George's Day concert.

The Annual Parochial Church Meeting is to be moved this year from a weekday to Sunday 30<sup>th</sup> April following on after the Sung Eucharist at 12.30pm. Members of the Parochial Church Council are elected at this meeting which is preceded by the Annual Vestry


**Meeting** to elect Churchwardens. Please join us to hear reports and plans for the future.





he Revd Dr Alan McCormack is a native of Northern Ireland who ministered in the Church of Ireland as Dean of Residence in Trinity College, Dublin for about a decade before moving to London in 2007. He was Rector of St Botolph without Bishopsgate and St Vedast-alias-Foster in the City of London before moving to his current role as the Dean of Goodenough College in Bloomsbury. He still maintains very close links with the City and was very recently Chaplain to the Rt Hon the Lord Mayor. Educated at Oxford and at Yale, his specialism is in Hebrew textual hermeneutics. A keen student of Chinese cultures, he has served as an Advisor on Chinese Christian Affairs to Rowan Williams, formerly Archbishop of Canterbury. To relax Alan attends the theatre (as befits a Member of the Garrick) and cooks. He practises mixed martial arts several times each week, which explains why he can rarely stay for sherry after church.

Father Alan MacCormack is Dean of Goodenough College. He writes as follows:

oodenough College is a College residential based in Bloomsbury which aims to provide a safe and stimulating environment for 700 students, and their families, from over 90 countries. The vision of Frederick Craufurd Goodenough, Chairman of Barclays DCO, the College is an independent charity founded in 1930. acquired Goodenough whole of Mecklenburgh Square for his new College and its fine buildings were designed by Sir Herbert Baker. The Patron of the College is Her Majesty the Queen whose most recent visit in December 2016 was marked by her re-visiting the College building she had in fact opened some sixty years ago.

College members study almost every subject imaginable (exclusively at graduate level) in every London tertiary institution imaginable. The College has an opera company, a symphony orchestra, many sporting teams and an annual TEDx conference. Lectures and sem-

inars happen on a daily basis in Term, often featuring some of the biggest names in global academe and public life.

The Dean co-ordinates the entirety of student activity and runs also an impressive 'Two Cities' representation programme where the talented young leaders-in-waiting hit the financial, parliamentary and diplomatic cocktail party circuits. It is pleasing to report that the Rector's HOLY COCKTAILS have already become a much desired addition to this social itinerary.



# OUR TEAM STARTS WORK IN EUROPE'S BIGGEST PRISON FOR WOMEN.

arch 2017 is the tenth anniversary of a report on women's prisons published under the leadership of Baroness Corston. This contained 43 recommendations, including a demand for all women's prisons to be replaced by small custodial units so that most women would serve their sentences in the community and attend local facilities to address such issues as mental illness, addiction and domestic violence. Some of the recommendations were adopted by the then Labour government and the number of women in custody was reduced, but the proposal for small local custodial centres was rejected in England and Wales and only partially implemented in Scotland.

The Corston Report lifted the lid on the scandalous conditions in which female prisoners were incarcerated. The review was triggered in 2006, after six women in HMP Styal, Cheshire killed themselves within thirteen months. Last year twelve women took their own lives while in prisons in England and Wales, double that when Corston visited several prisons and was shocked by the scale of mental illness, abuse and deprivation. In 2016 the Prison Governors Association called for a new Independent Public Inquiry because of the "unprecedented rise of violence, self harm and suicides" in prisons for both men and women.

Today, six out of ten women are homeless when discharged from prison. Women's Centres can be a vital anchor in otherwise chaotic lives, but many are now facing closure due to cuts in funding. Baroness Corston now says that "the overwhelming majority of these women are troubled rather than

troublesome". She argues that women offenders should be treated differently. Among the differences she points out are that emotional, physical and sexual abuse, as well as self harm and domestic violence are much more common in the female prison poputhan lation the many male. Also, women are sole parents and coerced into crime by men. She says that "it's a sys-tem that sets fragile women up to fail.

their victims all deserve a better kind of justice".

The Churches Together in Westminster, Prisons Mission, of which St George's church is on of the founding members, has recently begun to work at HMP Bronzefield, near Ashford in Middlesex. Since the closure of the ancient Holloway prison last year, this has become the largest prison for women in Europe. It is managed by the French company Sodexo and holds 550 women, from those remanded in custody while awaiting trial, to those serving sentences, including "life", following conviction for the most serious crimes. The prison looks very different from the typical huge, forbidding, Victorian, panoptic monstrosities. Once inside the outer, security walls, it comprises a dozen largely self contained two and three story cell blocks, surrounded by grass lawns, trees and flower beds. It is much quieter and lighter than the old prisons for men.

The Managing Chaplain Marcel McCarron (Anglican) leads a small multi-faith team of male and female chaplains. He is keen to make good use of our Prisons Mission participants for a wide variety of both challenging and rewarding activities. He asks, for example, "how can you approach a regular weekly meeting with a young woman who is just beginning to face up to the fact that she will spend the next fifteen years of her life in prison and be in her early forties when eventually discharged? How can we be of value to her?"



We have made several exploratory visits to HMP Bronzefield and a group of volunteers from three "engaged" churches are now undergoing the usual lengthy, bureaucratic process of gaining security clearance, before beginning regular attendance there. We are confident that the experiences and lessons learned through our work at the big London prisons for young and adult men, we are ready and able to be useful to the multi-faith chaplaincy team and the inmates at this prison for women. Regular reports of progress and problems will be given to the Parochial Church Council and to any members of the congregation.

#### PRISONS WEEK 8-15 OCTOBER 2017

Last year, more local churches than ever devised interesting and effective ways to mark **Prisons Week.** The special CTiW booklet, to which several St George's people made a big contribution was used by churches, of many denominations, well beyond London. We are already working on a new and improved booklet, which will include a wider variety of prayers, reflections, a quiz and suggestions for special services and discussions. The aim is to communicate information about prisons, prisoners, staff, the criminal justice system and victims of crime, and to interest congregations about a part of contemporary life which is usually "out of sight and out of mind". We need your suggestions in order to make the 2017 booklet more authentic and more useful.

### Modern Slavery Seminar

'Sins before Our Eyes' held in Istanbul on 6th-7th February 2017

The Revd Dr Alan McCormack writes:

was honoured to be invited to the Seminar on Modern Slavery held in Istanbul on 6th-7th February 2017 by His All Holiness Bartholomew, Patriarch of Constantinople, New Rome. This initiative of the Ecumenical Patriarchate was held in conjunction with the Church of England to examine the response of the Orthodox and Anglican Churches to the scourge of modern slavery, debt slavery and human trafficking in the modern world. Seminar participants felt that slavery was very clearly tied to issues of migration. My invitation to attend came directly from His Eminence Nikitas, Metropolitan of the Dardanelles, with whom I had worked closely many years ago while he was Metropolitan of Hong Kong.

The seminar will in God's grace provide a stimulus to Christian thinking in this increasingly important area of human brokenness.

It is clear that the churches' response to issues in modern slavery has now been put on a firmer and more formal footing following this seminar. It concluded in the issuing of a joint declaration, the 'Istanbul Declaration':

#### Modern Slavery -A Joint Declaration

1. We, Bartholomew, Archbishop of Constantinople-New Rome and Ecumenical Patriarch, and Justin, Archbishop of Canterbury and Primate of All England, cosponsored a special international Forum on Modern Slavery titled "Sins Before Our Eyes" at the Phanar from February 6-7, 2017. The Forum, originally proposed during the official visit by the Ecumenical Patriarch to Lambeth Palace in November 2015, was a high-level gathering of distinguished scholars, practitioners and policymakers from around the world, invited to discuss the contemporary problem of human exploitation. The Forum also takes place within the context of 2017: The Year of the Sanctity of Childhood, as declared by the Ecumenical Patriarchate.



- 2. For religious communities worldwide and for the global human-rights community, the protection of human dignity and fundamental human rights is of utmost importance. The role of the Church in the world is "to preach good news to the poor, to bind up the brokenhearted, to proclaim release to the captives and to set at liberty the oppressed." (Isaiah 61.1, Luke 4.18) This was clearly articulated in the final Encyclical of the Holy and Great Council of the Orthodox Church (Crete, June 2016): "The Church lives not for herself. She offers herself for the whole of humanity in order to raise up and renew the world into a new heaven and a new earth."
- 3. We are convinced that there is an intimate and inseparable link between preserving God's natural creation and protecting God's image in every human being, especially those most vulnerable to the myriad forms of human exploitation that comprise the sin of modern slavery. The same arrogance and greed are to blame for the oppression and exploitation of innocent victims - most often children and women - of human trafficking, human smuggling, prostitution, the sale of human organs, indentured labor, and the many other dimensions of modern slavery. Each and every person bears the burden and pays the price for the fact that there are more people in slavery today than at any other time in history.
- 4. In his keynote address, the Ecumenical Patriarch observed: "The Orthodox Church is often accused of neglecting the world for the sake of liturgical worship and spiritual life, turning primarily toward the Kingdom of God to come, disregarding chalenges of the present. In fact, however, whatever the Church says, whatever the Church does, is done in the Name of God and for the sake of human dignity and the eternal destiny of the human being. It is impossible for the Church to close its eyes to evil, to be indifferent to the cry of the needy,

oppressed and exploited. Faith is a source of permanent struggle against the powers of in-humanity." In his opening address, In his opening address, Archbishop Welby emphasized: "Slavery is all around us, but we are too blind to see it. It is in our hands, and yet we are too insensitive to touch it. The enslaved are next to us in the streets, but we are too ignorant to walk alongside them. It must not be relegated to a footnote in history. It is still a living reality in all of our communities, as I have seen from personal experience in the United Kingdom, not because we think it is acceptable, but because our sin lies in blindness and ignorance."

#### 5. Therefore,

- i. We condemn all forms of human enslavement as the most heinous of sins, inasmuch as it violates the free will and the integrity of every human being created in the image of God.
- ii. We **commend** the efforts of the international community and endorse the United Nations Protocol to Prevent, Suppress and Punish Trafficking in Persons, especially Women and Children.
- iii. We **pray** that all victims of modern slavery may be liberated in order to rebuild their lives and that the perpetrators may be brought to justice.
- iv. We **repent** for not doing nearly enough swiftly enough to curb the plague of modern slavery, acknowledging that our ignorance and indifference are the worst forms of tolerance and complicity. We are judged each day by what we refuse to see and fail to do for the most vulnerable among us.
- v. We **appeal** to local and national governments to pass and implement strict laws against modern slavery, with a budget and capability to ensure organizations are held

- to account for modern slavery in their supply chains, while also allocating resources and services for trafficking victims, who are exposed to and endangered by such injustice.
- vi. We **encourage** our leaders to find appropriate and effective ways of **prosecuting** those involved in human trafficking, **preventing** all forms of modern slavery, and **protecting** its victims in our communities and promoting **hope** wherever people are exploited.
- vii. We **urge** our faithful and communities the members of the Orthodox Church and the Church of England as well as all people of good will to become educated, raise awareness, and take action with regard to these tragedies of modern slavery, and to commit themselves to working and praying actively towards the eradication of this scourge against humanity.
- Viii. We commit to the establishment of a joint taskforce for modern slavery to bring forward timely recommendations as to how the Orthodox Church and the Church of England can collaborate in the battle against this cruel exploitation.
