

bservant readers of this thrice-yearly publication may have noticed that it varies capriciously in extent between 12 and 16 pages. Indeed on one occasion it even extended to a massive 20 pages. Behind the scenes, Murphy - if he'll forgive me - ensures that submitted copy inevitably falls somewhere between the magazine editor's nemesis: the four-page multiple. Which is why I am immoderately grateful when a verbal contribution comes conveniently linked to a picture or two. The pictures accompanying the Prisons Mission piece in this issue are an eloquent case in point. They come courtesy of The Koestler Trust by way of the 2017 Prisons Week booklet.

Pictures can of course hunt on their own. I had initially thought to make this an undercroft-free edition but the picture that heads this page suggested otherwise. Yes, work on converting the St George's undercroft from a storage area to something integral to the life of the parish finally began in August and, all being well, will be complete by early next summer. Meanwhile we are learning how to cope with just one loo and the occasional jack-hammerinduced earth tremors.

The long-term consequences of operating on two floors instead of one are beginning to emerge. One of them is the renewed interest being shown in St George's as a musician-friendly venue by a number of A-list ensembles and choirs. (St Sepulchre's nota bene.) Another is the possibility of being able to host exhibitions of visual art. And behind the scenes we now finally boast an online operational diary with the capacity to record activity on both floors. Is it too fanciful to see diary entries for weddings in late 2018 and 2019 as an early warning of a surge of in-

terest once wedding couples realise they can book a one-stop wedding day at St George's, incorporating both the marriage and reception?

Meanwhile life in the Parish continues in all its long-established diversity.

It is all of six years ago that we introduced the Food Coupon Scheme for the homeless in partnership with the Cabmen's Shelter in Hanover Square. Some 150 or so coupons, each now valued at £2.30, are dispensed weekly from the Vestry.

lease pray for all involved in choosing a new Bishop. The Diocese is in the process of searching for a new Bishop of London and there has so far been one meeting of the Crown Nominations Commission - with two more scheduled in November. Every Diocese has a Vacancy in See Committee which meets only as required. The membership in London comprises:

- The Area and other Suffragan bishops (6 seats)
- The Dean of St Paul's (or, if unable to serve, a member of the Chapter not already a member of the Committee) (1 seat)
- Two Archdeacons (to represent the archdeacons in the Diocese) (2 seats)
- The proctors elected by the Diocese to the Lower House of Convocation of the General Synod (currently 11 seats)
- The members of the House of Laity of the General Synod elected by the Diocese (currently 11 seats)
- The Chairmen of the House of Clergy and of the House of Laity of the Diocesan Synod (2 seats)
- Elected membership: 4 clerical and 12 lay (total: 16 seats)
- Up to 4 nominations by the Bishop's Council

This committee draws up a 'statement of needs' for the Diocese and from its number elects 6 representatives to serve on the Crown Nominations Commission. The membership of that body includes people from the Diocese and the National church: the Archbishops of Canterbury and York, and 3 elected members of the both the General Synod's House of Clergy and

Laity. In addition to the 14 voting members of the Commission, the Prime Minister's and Archbishop's appointments secretaries act in an advisory capacity.

I have to say that I was given every opportunity to be involved in what was a very wide and open consultation process in the spring and summer - invited by email and follow-up emails to attend meetings. Unfortunately I couldn't make any of them, although there were several dates on offer. And so the process appears to have been transparent. Indeed you might have offered your own thoughts, as comments and suggestions were invited from all. I did however send in a few thoughts, and some others I am not publishing, as well as the names of 2 possible candidates for consideration.

- 1. The strength of the Diocese of London relies more on its clergy than its bishops and senior leadership. I'm often amazed and frequently impressed by the quality and general talent of the parish clergy who rather outshine the top brass. We need as good a bishop as we can find as the Diocesan but also need to avoid getting a bad one. In fact avoiding a bad appointment is rather more important I think!
- 2. It would be good to find a real pastor.
- 3. Please don't ignore the Ecumenical dimension of the appointment. The Diocese has rather lacked leadership in this area, although locally many good things are going on.

We hope and pray that over the coming months we are blessed with good news that a suitable person has been chosen to serve us as Bishop.

We welcome onto the team of vergers Richard Buck who joins us having finished his term leading the Students' Union at the Royal Academy of Music and who has been working alongside Seamus O'Hare. Richard has written a few introductory words which appear on page 6.

Sadly we have lost **Dr Thomas Miskell**, a member of the Parochial Church Council, a Parish Clerk, devoted member of the Prayer Book Society, and until his recent decline a regular member of the

congregation, and sometime Churchwarden of St Margaret, Lothbury. The Rector there (Jeremy Crossley) and I planned to take Tom out for a pub lunch to try and cheer him up early in July, and when we arrived were told he had died in his home and discovered a few days later. He wanted no funeral, but Jeremy and I were asked to inter his ashes recently in the Columbarium at St Mary's, Bourne Street with a representative of the Parish Clerks and the Prayer Book Society in attendance. May Tom rest in God's peace.

In July we also bade a sad farewell to Giles Pilgrim Morris, one of the many notable musicians who enhance our worship Sunday by Sunday. An Appreciation of Giles appears on Page 11.

#### **Christmas Services**

The Parish Carol Service (the traditional Nine Lessons and Carols) is to take place this year on Sunday 17<sup>th</sup> December at 6.00pm followed by refreshments. Again this is a wonderful service to prepare for Christmas and a good occasion to invite friends along. We always invite people from local hotels and embassies and shops and businesses, as this is a wonderful celebration for the whole community. In addition I also invite members of various organisations to which I am Chaplain (The Royal Society of St George, the Gastronomes, the Royal Society of Musicians, and others) who are most welcome.

**Christmas Eve** will be very busy this year as it falls on a Sunday.

Sung Eucharist for the Fourth Sunday in Advent at 11am as normal.

We shall once again have a service for families and children on Christmas Eve at 4.30pm: Solemn Sung Eucharist of the Vigil of Christmas, with half choir, which will include the singing of children's carols around the crib. The sermon will be short and geared towards children, and the style of worship relaxed, although still with a normal sung setting of the Mass.

I would encourage as many as are able to come to the main celebration of the Nativity of Our Lord, which is the glorious 11.00am Sung Eucharist on Christmas Day. Please do invite your family and

visitors to join you for this, or to the Christmas Eve service if you find Christmas Day impracticable.

There are daily prayers in church, Monday - Thursday at 12.10pm. The Midday Office is said on most days except when the Eucharist is celebrated on Fridays and Saints Days. Please join us if you are in the area.



## A new Verger

n 1st October Richard Buck joined us as Verger, working sideby-side with Seamus O'Hare.

Richard hails from the Rose of the Shires, Northamptonshire, where he grew up in the village of Byfield, before moving to London in 2011. He attended Lawrence Sheriff School in Rugby and he was a product of the Northamptonshire Music Service performing regularly with the County Youth Brass Band and County Youth Guitar Ensemble. After originally starting his musical studies on the Euphonium, he moved onto the Trombone in his teens, where he was granted a Scholarship to study at the Royal Academy of Music in 2014.

Richard was at the Academy for 6 years where he received his Bachelor and Master's Degree and he was also President of the Students' Union for a year. During his time at the Academy, he studied with Robert Hughes and Keith McNicoll and he also took part in masterclasses with



Elgar Howarth, Ian Bousfield, Stefan Schulz and Jorgen Van Rijen. Richard was fortunate to perform regularly with the RAM Symphony Orchestra where he played under esteemed conductors including Semyon Bychkov, Edward Gardner, Marin Alsop and Sir Mark Elder. A passionate Chamber Musician, Richard is the founder of the Buck Brass Trio, one of Europe's only Professional Brass Trios. The ensemble have added a large amount of music to the repertoire through commissions as well as their own arrangements and they have a busy concert schedule around the IIK.

Throughout his life, Richard has been involved with the Church, first singing in the Choir at Holy Cross Church, Byfield and then since moving to London as a member of the Choir at St George's Church, Harrow where he also plays the organ for the weekly Evensong. His Family are also heavily involved with the church as his father has been the Churchwarden at Holy Cross Church, Byfield for 22 years and his sister was a Verger at Peterborough Cathedral. They have been able to give him tips of how to deal with the expected deluge of requests two minutes before a Service is due to begin!

In his spare time, Richard enjoys sports, attending talks at Chatham House and exploring London's many fine public houses!



#### A sermon

# preached at the Confirmation of Finley Mather on Sunday 1<sup>st</sup> October at St George's, Hanover Square.

ccording to St Luke, as we've just heard, the risen Jesus' last act before he ascended into Heaven was to lift up his hands and bless his disciples and other followers who were present with him.

Blessing is Jesus' characteristic action throughout his ministry and, we may say, his life. The very fact that he entered the life of this world is a blessing of that whole life. The very fact that he came as a human being is a blessing of our humanity. The fact that he lived and shared life with us is a blessing of our life together and the life of each of us. And we can even say that his willingness to die for us and with us is a blessing of death and all our deaths.

Jesus is God's blessing of the life of the world and we are still living in the light of that blessing, which is why Finley is coming for Confirmation this morning. For Confirmation is in its essence a blessing - a very significant blessing for it is in response to Finley's wish to give his life to God and to live his life with and for God.

And blessing is always God's response to our movement, however small, towards knowing God more fully in our lives. Life with God is always mutualit's rather like a dance; God moves and we move in response, we move and God moves in response. We bless God by thanking him and loving him, knowing his goodness towards us all, and he blesses us in response with that same goodness.

As it is in Jesus' nature to bless - he almost can't help blessing. though when we curse God or

life or one another as too often we do, it is hard for the blessing to get through, but as it is in Jesus' nature to bless it is unsurprising that it is in God's nature too to bless and indeed to be a blessing.

Jesus is a revelation -THE revelation - of God and therefore of his nature, to bless and to be a blessing. Confirmation shares in that character of God's blessing revealed in Jesus. We come humbly, kneeling down, repenting of our sins, asking for forgiveness and confessing our need for God. And God comes to us in Christ through the laying on of hands and the anointing to assure us that not only is he with us but he is in us sharing his life, sharing our lives. From now on Finley is a blessed person and he will live the rest of his life in that knowledge.

Which is not to say he was unblessed before for no one is excluded from God's favour except by our own decision and even then I am not sure we can negate God's love and goodness towards us. And of course that is true for all of us - for just by being here, by our wish to live well, by our baptism and confirmation, by our receiving communion, by whatever small action or intention towards receiving God's goodness and his blessing we open ourselves up to receive him and all that he wishes to give us.

But it is a mutual process. God blesses us that we may become a blessing: a blessing for God himself that we in some small way may like Jesus stand as evidence of the reality of God and his purpose for us all, that we with Jesus may be a revelation of God in our own time and place. And that we may be a blessing to the life of the

world, to our neighbours, our friends, our family, even our enemy and those who are unknown to us.

God blesses us that we may be part of a new Creation reflecting the goodness and love of God. St Peter in our first reading this morning has some grand things to say about those of us who know and welcome God's blessing - "You are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's own people" these are descriptions that are worth exploring. They describe what God intends for us, what he blesses us for - that we may become what he has already made us to be. It is a life-time's - and beyond - piece of work that we all set our hands to as we say "Yes" to God's blessing.


aint Georges Hanover Square was one of the first to embrace the CTiW Prisons Mission the congregation contains several of the most active volunteers in the programme. Prison week this year 8th -15th October was celebrated during the usual Sunday service by readings appropriate to the occasion and the distribution of the Resources for Prison Week booklet to the congregation

Some of the statistics relating to custody are heartbreaking. 65% of boys who have a father in prison will go on to offend. 80% of .Boys who have spent time in the care system go on to offend. 76% of young offenders grew up in a fatherless home. In addition prisons have become much more violent places and assaults prisoner on prisoner have risen 68% over the last 10 years. In the same period incidents of self- harm have risen by 61%. Nor must we forget that those whose duty it is to guard and to work within our prisons are increasingly putting themselves at risk. 2430 assaults on staff were recorded in the same period.

Reoffending rates are similarly shocking and especially for those for whom their original sentence was less than 12 months. Faced with the story of one young woman, released with just 46 pounds in her pocket, a sleeping bag and a pop up festival tent or that of a young man released to a hostel without even a mattress for him. It is requires no great feat of imagination to wonder why reoffending rates are so high.

Last year Alistair Milward spoke eloquently of his sense of the overwhelming nature of the problems inherent within the Prison system. By befriending prisoners due to be released and continuing to support them on the outside he cherished the conviction that his actions could make a difference to "someone of whom the concept of hope has got lost in their locked up world".

This year during the address he described the prison system as a whole as "smooth impenetrable granite. Unyielding charmless and grim at first it seems impossible to climb". He went on to say that he thought that, at last some small hand and footholds had begun to appear



and the sense of hopefulness begins to be justified.

Those hand holds appear are due to the great work and perseverance of our volunteers and the chaplaincy teams that they support. The examples offered of Alistair and Finna working as a befrienders Tony visiting men at risk of self-harm and Joanna reaching out simply through her presence are encouraging and inspiring. In conclusion Alistair said "We can't do much to repair a broken looking system. What we can do is something."

In conclusion John Plummer stated that the prison mission should like to expand its area of operations and there are plans to mount an exhibition of prisoners' artwork in conjunction with the Koestler trust. The aim would be to showcase the work and highlight the CTiW Prison Project

#### **NEW CHURCH**

Notre Dame de France, the Roman Catholic church off Leicester Square has decided to "engage" with the CTiW Prisons Mission. They will thus join the small group of central London churches which have made a formal commitment to this initiative. After engaging, a group of volunteers from each church then undertake the outreach work in support of the multi-faith Chaplaincy Team in one of the London prisons and report back on issues and activities to the management and congregations. The Coordinator is presently in negotiation with several churches which are also considering engagement and expected to join soon.

#### **SEX OFFENDERS**

Our volunteers have been concerned about the plight of men, convicted

of sex offences, who are serving custodial sentences for sex offences. They are often particularly isolated, vulnerable and at risk of violence while in prisons. Such inmates are inclined to be excluded from befriending programmes

which mentor men before and after discharge, to facilitate rehabilitation and resettlement. They are seldom able to return to families and homes on discharge and are prohibited from many types of employment.

We now have Prisons Mission volunteers working with Circles UK, a specialist, national, not for profit organisation, which provides a programme of training, support and counselling for recently discharged sex offenders to reduce the risks of reoffending. We seek a few additional volunteers to undertake training for this very sensitive, but valuable work.

#### **IMMIGRATION REMOVAL CENTRES**

Many readers will have seen the recent, deeply shocking, BBC Panorama programme which showed staff at an Immigration Removal Centre, violently abusing detainees. Well before this broadcast, our Prisons Mission volunteers had decided to offer support to the Managing Chaplain to the centre near Heathrow airport. This is not a departure from the primary purpose of the mission, but an extension of its reach.

About 500 men and 20 women are detained, indefinitely at this centre, without judicial process, while appeals are heard, cases reviewed, asylum applications considered and decisions made as to whether they should be allowed to remain in the UK, temporarily

or permanently, or be deported. On average, just over half of those detained are allowed to remain, often after months of custody. Apart from the question of legitimacy, these people suffer very severe anxiety, fear, distress and uncertain-The Salvation Army recently identified one such detainee, who had been illegally trafficked into this country and then kept in captivity on a cannabis farm, until this was raided by the police. Some would say that he could have been an invaluable prosecution witness in a case against the traffickers, but he was just sent for removal. The fear of this detainee, to find himself in custody again, can be imagined.

The chaplain wants our help and we seek additional volunteers. They will not be pushed into the deep end, but be supported and learn with their peers through regular Review Meetings. For further information or for a preliminary discussion, contact John Plummer.

## Giles Pilgrim Morris



t is with great sadness that we record the death on 13<sup>th</sup> July 2017 at the age of 50 of Giles Pilgrim Morris, sometime member of the choirs of both St George's and the Grosvenor Chapel.

Giles was born in Ealing in August 1966, the youngest of three children. His father had been a colonial officer in Northern Rhodesia and at the time of Giles's birth was working for the Hong Kong government. The family moved to Hong King when Giles was just 19 days old. His mother, a music teacher and journalist, sang in the Hong Kong Bach Choir and young Giles studied at the German Swiss International School, where he started playing the violin.

Returning to Britain, it was at the suggestion of Roger Lawrence, director of music at Felsted School, Essex which he attended, that Giles began singing countertenor at the age of 16. He started singing professionally while studying history at Westfield College, University of London.

His first professional engagement was at Grosvenor Chapel in January 1985 and soon he was a Gentleman of the Chapel Royal, Hampton Court Palace. Other choirs in which over the years he sang included those of St George's, Hanover Square, St Paul's Church, Knightsbridge, the Wren Chapel at the Royal Hospital, Chelsea, and the Guards Chapel, Wellington Barracks.

Outside the world of performance, he served (briefly) in the army, worked at Lloyds Bank, for Grundig in Germany and at the Associated Board of the Royal Schools of Music. In 2006 he became international programmes manager at Robert Gordon University, Aberdeen, where he also sang as a lay-clerk at St Andrew's Cathedral. He later occupied a similar role at Bournemouth University. In 2012 he became the British representative of Breitkopf & Härtel, the German music publisher, liaising on the company's behalf with British music stores and promoters, handling remittances and representing them at conferences.

Throughout this time he maintained his singing career. A brain tumour was discovered in 2016 but he continued to sing. On one occasion, only days after brain surgery, he took part in a concert at Westminster Cathedral wearing a black biretta over his wound and squinting through the corner of his eye to read the music.

Giles's funeral took place at St James's, Sussex Gardens - a High Mass of Requiem - at which a choir of more than 60 of his colleagues sang him to his rest to the strains of Frank Martin's splendid Mass for Double Choir, Messiaen's O Sacrum Convivium and Balfour Gardiner's Evening Hymn.






